Message from the Mayor's Office

Moving from Black History Month to March, which is also the month that we celebrate women, I find myself reflecting on an event that I recently attended. On Feb. 20, I had the pleasure of attending a Black History Month panel discussion celebrating "women of the movement" hosted by First Lady Michelle Obama at the White House. The panelists – which included pioneers such as Carlotta Walls LaNier, one of the Little Rock Nine group of students who integrated Little Rock Central High School in the 1950s, and award-winning journalist Charlayne Hunter-Gault, the first black woman to attend the University of Georgia – were some of the most positive, energetic, inspirational and courageous Black women that I have ever come across. If you have some time, please go online and listen to their powerful statements. A video clip of the panel discussion is available on the White House YouTube Channel at www.youtube.com/user/whitehouse. The video clip is titled "The First Lady Speaks at "Celebrating Women of the Movement" Event and runs about an hour long.

In her introductory remarks, the First Lady referred to education as the "single most important civil rights issue" facing the country. She stressed the need for our youth to complete high school education and beyond, and that every month – not just February – should be devoted to the learning of Black History. She said it's on all of us (parents, friends, neighbors, teachers, administrators, counselors, mentors, community leaders, etc.) to help lift our children and make sure they achieve their highest potential. It is also the responsibility of our youth to listen, understand and take to heart the stories/accomplishments of their predecessors so that they will "translate the victories that these women won into habits." Finally, to echo the First Lady's sentiments, I believe I speak for all of us when I say that at times there will be struggles, and our youth will struggle at many points in their lives. At that moment, do not be afraid to ask for help. Do not be afraid to talk about your concerns to a parent, teacher or anyone else whom you consider a trustworthy mentor/confidant. If you are worried that you are not passing a class, or you are afraid that you will not be able to pay for college or whatever it may be, always remember it helps to talk to someone, because they may be able to help you or connect you to the right people who can help you. And of course, my door is always open to those who need help.

On another important note, I would like to remind our Town residents that March is Women's History Month. This month's theme is "Weaving the Stories of Women's Lives". I strongly encourage all of you to take part in this special celebration and pay tribute to the generations of women whose contributions have proved invaluable to society and helped to weave the fabric of our nation's history. ELECTION INFORMATION WEDNESDAY, MARCH 11, 2015

Polls will open at the Municipal Building, 5508 Arapahoe Drive, Forest Heights from 11:00 a.m. through 8:00 p.m. Wednesday, March 11, 2015. The election will be conducted by the Town's Board of Elections. Only those registered voters will be permitted to vote in this election.

Voters are reminded that we will be using paper ballots. These will be a write-in capability; however, inadequate identification of a person for whom a write-in ballot is cast makes that ballot subject to disqualification. Election results will be published in the special March edition of the Forest Heights' newsletter and the newly elected officials will be sworn into office at the March 18, 2015 Town Meeting.

ABSENTEE VOTING

1. Any voter who is qualified and registered to vote in the Town Elections is entitled to vote by absentee ballot, provided the following conditions are met in accordance with Section 1 of Charter Amendment Resolution 1 of 1992:

Any qualified voter registered to vote who may be absent from the Town of Forest Heights on any Election Day.

Any qualified voter registered to vote whose physical ability, confinement or restriction on any Election Day.

Absentee ballots must be received no later than the close of the polls on March 11, 2015.

2. A qualified voter desiring to vote in any election by absentee ballot shall make application for an absentee ballot in writing to the Board of Elections. The application must be received no later than 7 days before the election. The application shall contain an affidavit, which need not be under oath, but which shall set forth information required under this section, under penalty of perjury. The application shall contain the following information:

The voter's name and residence address

That the person is a qualified voter at the residence given.

If the person voted at the preceding election, the residence address from which he voted; and

That the voter expects in good faith to be unable to vote in person for the reasons stated in 1.a. or 1.b.

Are you having difficulty paying your energy bills? Does your home need energy efficiency retrofits? According the US Dept. of Energy, “checking a home’s insulation is one of the fastest and most cost effective ways to use a whole-house approach to reduce energy waste and make the most of your energy dollars.”



The Collaboration of Towns is once again offering low to moderate income household’s renovation, rehabilitation in conjunction with weatherization. Homeowner must meet income criteria and be willing to provide documentation that income is BELOW the following:

(Veterans and/or Retired Homeowners will be given preference)

1 person: income below \$36,000 \$0 cost \$36,000-\$64,000 10% \$73,100 10%	2 people: income under \$51,600 \$0 cost \$51,600-

- Had an energy audit within the past 6 months; Aggressive dogs not being safely handled; Drug use;
- Threats to auditor; Home is sealed too tight resulting in the inability of fumes to escape through natural ventilation;
- Major roof issues; Major plumbing problems; Gas leak; Structurally inadequate; Rental property;
- Plaster ceiling (which needs a hatch cut to blow insulation into the attic).

Community Healthy Heights Tips

Forest Heights Hosts First Anti-Bullying Forum

Forest Heights-Oxon Hill community members, officials and stakeholders met to discuss bullying and ways to prevent bullying at a Feb. 28 forum held at the Town Hall Building. The forum kicked off with remarks from Mayor Jacqueline Goodall; Wendell Coleman, principal at Oxon Hill Middle School; and Ken Wade, Prince George's County Sheriff's Office and an ambassador for Project for Change.

Forest Heights Police Chief Stewart Russell delivered a presentation on the signs of bullying and what can be done to prevent bullying, namely:

- If you are being bullied or know someone who is being bullied, alert a responsible adult. It can be a parent, teacher, advisor, principal, vice principal, etc.
- Understand that being bullied is NOT your fault.
- Understand that it is ok to ask for help.
- Don't be a victim: Act and look confident, and if someone is picking on you, don't show them it hurts.

Good citizens can do the right thing by:

- Not joining in and/or refusing to watch someone getting bullied.
- Saying something – "Hey don't do that to him (her)."
- Reporting bullying to an adult.
- Inviting the person who is being bullied to join your group.
- Being a friend to a person who is being bullied.
- Distracting the bully so that he or she stops.



Chief Russell also enlisted a few of our young participants to recite the Resolution of Respect, where they pledged to stand up to bullying and to respect other people's differences.

We would like to acknowledge Mrs. (Bean) Hawkins and Ms. Bonita Anderson who coordinated the event, Mr. Coleman, Mr. Wade, Chief Russell and the Forest Heights Police Department for their involvement.

Did You Know?

•Oxon Run (a tributary of the Potomac River) has wetlands that include four rare northern magnolia bogs – the only such plant communities in the entire National Park System. Only 13 magnolia bogs are known to exist in the Atlantic Coastal Plain area, and these are threatened by habitat destruction and fragmentation. The National Park Service is working to protect these wetlands. Make sure you enjoy the beautiful bogs this spring when they bloom.

•The oldest fruit tree in the National Park Service can be found at Oxon Hill Farm. For centuries the making of cider from apples has been more than just pressing fruit to provide a delicious drink. WSSC's Customer Notification System (CNS)!

WSSC's Customer Notification System (CNS) (available at <https://www.wsscwater.com>) allows WSSC to alert customers about WSSC-related work in your area. CNS uses e-mail and cell phone text messaging to send notifications to the e-mail addresses and cell phone numbers you register with the system.

How CNS Works

When WSSC confirms that a water or wastewater-related incident is affecting an address you have registered, WSSC sends an e-mail and/or text messages to the devices that you have provided.

Sign Up for CNS

To ensure you receive WSSC notifications, set up your spam filter so it will allow the alerts. Register using the button on WSSC's webpage to receive e-mail and/or text message alerts about WSSC incidents or work near your home, office, school or other important addresses in our service area. You will automatically receive emergency notifications for boil water advisories, water main breaks, sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs) and road or lane closures caused by WSSC work. You can choose to receive additional alerts about WSSC-related public meetings or hearings.

This service is FREE. However, your cell phone provider's standard text messaging charges DO apply. WSSC cannot automatically sign you up for CNS, so we invite you to sign up below. If you register for CNS, make sure WSSC notifications are on your company's white list and are not blocked by your personal spam filter.
